OSBI'S CURT TERRY TAKES ON NEW ROLE AS WOODWARD PD POLICE CHIEF



On March 20, 2017, OSBI special agent Curt Terry took on the new role of Woodward, Oklahoma Chief of Police. Terry, (pictured right, with his newly appointed Assistant Chief of Police, Billy Parker), is a native of Woodward, population 12,051. His

law enforcement career spans 27 years, beginning at William S. Key Correctional Center. He then moved to the Woodward County Sheriff's Office. He left WCSO to work at Mooreland Police Department. In 1996 Terry worked for the Woodward Police Department as an officer, and later, a detective. He

joined the OSBI in 2008, eventually moving to the Crime Scene Unit in 2013. Chief Terry states, "It's good to be back. It's a challenge, but one I look forward to." (woodwardnews.net).

DAVID WADE, SLAIN LOGAN COUNTY DEPUTY SHERIFF, HONORED BY OK IAI



On April 18, 2017, Logan County Deputy Sheriff David Wade was shot at approximately 8:30 a.m. as he attempted to serve an eviction notice at a residence near the intersection of CR 66 and Midwest Boulevard, outside of Mulhall, Oklahoma. One of three subjects he encountered at the scene opened fire on Deputy Wade, striking him multiple times in the face and body. Wade was able to radio for backup after he was shot. He was flown to a hospital in Oklahoma City, where he was pronounced dead.

The suspect, later identified as Nathan Aaron LeForce, allegedly stole Deputy Wade's patrol truck and fled the scene. He then abandoned the vehicle and carjacked a citizen in a nearby town. LeForce was taken into custody several hours later. He is being charged with Murder in the First Degree-Malice Aforethought, Larceny of Motor Vehicle, AFCF and Armed Robbery in the First Degree, AFCF.

Logan County District Attorney Laura Austin Thomas states a bill for the death penalty will be filed, identifying three aggravators; he killed a law enforcement officer in performance of his duties, is a continuing threat to society, and the death was particularly heinous, obstructus and cruel.

Deputy Wade served three years with the Logan County Sheriff's Office. He was a U.S. Army veteran, survived by his wife and three children. Wade, pictured above (center) with Logan County deputies Antonio Valencia and Pete Wagner, was an active member of the OK IAI.
